

### *From the Pastor's Desk*

This is my first opportunity to greet you through our Newsletter, and I look forward to getting to know you, visiting and listening to you. We are at the nexus of change in the season and in the congregation. Celebrating Holy Communion with Christians all around the world on October 2<sup>nd</sup> and then Canadian Thanksgiving the following week is exciting for me and I hope also for you.

In his play, *Murder in the Cathedral*, T. S. Lewis wrote, “*The worst sin is doing the right deed for the wrong reason.*” Why do we do good deeds? Is it to make a show for our goodness before the world? How sad if we are doing the outward works of the gospel for the wrong reason! *Do-goodism* is not Christianity. We could spend our whole life doing good deeds and yet not be a Christian. Without Christ, no matter how good we may be, we are not Christians. Jesus said, *At the end of time, many will say to me, 'Lord, have we not prophesied in Your name? And in Your name cast out devils and in Your name done many wonderful works?' And then I will say to them, 'I never knew you, leave me alone, you who work iniquity.'* [Matt.7:22].

What changed the early disciples from desperate men to hopeful disciples, from discouraged supporters to empowered disciples? Was it an act of goodness they did? Was it a compassionate and random exercise of kindness that lifted their spirits? No, it was nothing they did, but rather what God did within them through the power of His Son. Christ the Lamb overcame death and the snare of sin and He is the One who changed the disciples. When they saw their Lord risen from the dead they knew life could never be the same. They knew all the power of God was there in Christ's victory.

My friends, God does not want good deeds – He wants you! He wants to transform you, empower you, forgive you and love you. And once you are His, strengthened within by the power of the risen Christ then good deeds will flow from you like water from a spring. You will be living in a loving, joyful response to an awesome Lord. Let us remember we are called to be an Easter people all through the year. We serve a risen Saviour. He is risen indeed!

2017 will be the 230<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of St. John's ministry and mission in Cornwall. We will honour the history and all those who have gone before us, but let us also prepare to celebrate the new things that God wants to do in our midst.

## *Reflections on 9. 11. 2001*

This September we have not been able to include reflection on the “9-11” incident of 2001. Although it is not an anniversary of celebration it is an anniversary that many around the world will not soon forget. I would like to share a few thoughts with you.

In the aftermath of the devastation caused by terrorists to lower Manhattan and the Pentagon, many people around the world wonder how anyone could act with so much hate and savagery. How could terrorists murder over 6,000 people and willingly forfeit their own lives in the process? What accounts for their behaviour and devotion to evil?

Whatever the reason this one thing we do know is that God does not endorse or sanction brutality and wanton destruction. To shout *Ali Achbar* (God be Praised!) while committing acts of terror is blasphemy. Then President Bush put it succinctly: *Freedom and fear, justice and cruelty, have always been at war, and we know that God is not neutral between them.*

You and I affirm that God wills goodness, not terror and annihilation. We believe this not just because we live in a beautiful, awesome world created by God; not just because we have a God-given conscience that helps us to understand what is good; not simply because there is within the human spirit a God-given longing for righteousness and truth. We know with even greater certainty that God wills what is good because He has given us His Son, Jesus Christ.

Christ brings clarity through His word. Jesus tells us, *Seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness.* (Matt. 6:33). *Those who live by the sword shall die by the sword* (26:52). *Strive to be perfect as your Father in heaven is perfect* (5:48). *Love your neighbour as you love yourself* (10:27). *Everyone who does evil hates the light* (John 3:20).

Christ brings clarity by His life. *He was tempted in every way as we are, yet without sin* (Heb. 4:15). *He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief ... pierced for our transgressions; He was crushed for our iniquities and the Lord laid upon Him the iniquity of us all.*  
(Is. 53:3,5,7-8).

Christ brings clarity by His victory. *Being in the very nature of God, ... he humbled Himself and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross. Therefore, God has exalted him and bestowed on Him the name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, ... and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.* (Phil. 2:6-11).


How do we know that God wills good and not evil for us, that He is not neutral in the spiritual struggle that rages around us? Because of Christ!

## CY 2016 in St. Catherines

In the heat of July, five members of St. John's headed west to the Niagara Escarpment and joined other Presbyterians for the Canada Youth 2016 conference at Brock University in St. Catherines. Lauren Thomas, Amanda Mullin and Bella Gwanyama were the youth from St. John's, Debbie Plant, was our youth leader and Dan Plant worked in the First Aid Room for the week. Each member had a slightly different experience from the event.



### Canada Youth: Casa Groups: Bella Gwanyama

CY 2016 was an amazing way to kick start my summer! Going into the experience I had no idea what to expect, I couldn't have imagined having the amount of fun that I did. The theme was 'Home' and in a weird way it truly did feel like it. A home is where you're with people you love, where you create memories and laugh and that's exactly what happened at CY. I was lucky enough to go with Amanda, Lauren and of course Debbie and it really helped having a few familiar faces. Of course I missed my family so much, but while away I also made a CY family! It took me a few days to get comfortable which makes sense and the same thing goes for a home when you just move in you have to get used to where everything is. Everyone at CY, though, was unimaginably friendly and welcoming; I made so many new friends and shared so much laughter with them! It was so nice to see everyone there for the same reason; to grow our faith in God and that's exactly what we did. Just like the hymn "We Are the Church" it's not the building itself that makes the church a church, or a home a home, it's the people inside. A home is somewhere you can go back to and I will definitely be going back to CY!

### Canada Youth: Casa Groups: Amanda Mullin

This summer, I was given the opportunity to go to Brock University for Canada Youth 2016. It was an amazing experience that I will never forget.

While I was there I met so many new people through my Casa Group. Casa means "home" in Spanish, which was the theme of CY this year. Casa groups were when the conference was split into groups of 30 with 5 leaders. Our groups would meet in a common room in one of the buildings at Brock.

We would begin Casa groups with a leader reading from the Bible.

Over the week, we followed the story of Ruth, and how God is not taken by the size of our bank accounts or our popularity, but by the quality of our character, just like he was with Ruth.

After the reading of the scripture, our leader would split us into micro-groups. Micro-groups are smaller groups of 7 in which we would discuss the scripture, answer questions, and share our opinions. The people in my micro-group were from all over the country. There were two girls from Edmonton, a couple from the Windsor area and a boy from London. As far away as we lived, and how different we were, we all had one thing in common, we were all Presbyterians.

By the end of CY I was very close with my Casa Group because we met for two hours almost every day. This was one of my favourite parts of CY because not only did I meet some amazing people, not only in my CASA Groups, but in other fun activities throughout the week, but I learned about the Lord through other ways besides discussion, such as skits, games, art and music.

Canada Youth 2016 was definitely a highlight of my summer, and I can't wait for 2018.

### **Canada Youth: Casa Groups: Lauren Thomas**

Canada Youth is such a wonderful and outstanding community that I have been blessed to be a part of, not just once, but for two amazing summers that will forever impact my life. When asked to compare my CY 2014 to 2016 experiences, who I went on the journeys with comes to mind. For Canada Youth 2014, St John's was represented by 5 youth. I was the youngest, as well as our only girl. I was a little nervous at first, five days, four nights, two train rides, four boys... and one Lauren? But I soon had no fears as then simply fellow congregation members quickly took me in as their adopted temporary younger sister. After having such a positive experience that year, I was very excited to attend CY 2016 with two of my best friends... 3 if you count Debbie- she's awesome!

I was now the oldest of our all girl group and had an amazing time bonding with Bella and Amanda over fellowship, lessons, music... and spotty wifi connections. But Canada Youth isn't just about the friendships you come with, it's also about the friendships with whom you leave the conference. In 2014, I shared the fellowship of Christ with hundreds of kids my age from across the country. I even made new friends from South Africa, Norway, Spain, and Korea. I was excited to reconnect with old friends this summer, as well as making many more.

What is so amazing about Canada Youth events is that although there were so many unique individuals gathered together, we were always united as one through the love and curiosity of our God. At both CY 2014 and 2016, many ethnicities, races, languages, disabilities, talents, and passions attended. We not only saw ourselves as equals, but as brothers and sisters through Christ. We all attended to have fun, learn, and grow as young people. CY is one of the places where I feel most proud to be a part of my generation. We are using our resources to make God's world a better place through fellowship and unquestioned acts of kindness.

Canada Youth 2014 and 2016 had different themes. 2014's theme was "Face to Face" as we learned from Paul's scripture to not only see others and ourselves for what they are materially on the outside, but for who they truly are on the inside. It was about not judging people for what they have, but to seek who they truly

are and want to be. Labels mean nothing when you are looking at yourself and others “Face to Face” as God does. I catch myself living by these teachings each day.

CY 2016’s theme was “We Are Home”. We were reminded that no matter how lost you are in this world, you will always find a home with Christ. Perhaps you have no roof, no belongings, no friends, but you will always be served all the comforts and blessings of a home in God. I often remind myself of this lesson whenever I feel lost and unsheltered in this world.

All in all, I feel so blessed to have attended Canada Youth for two consecutive events. They have been a part of the milestones I am passing as a growing and maturing young person. A big thank-you goes out to Debbie for organizing everything and ensuring our wonderfully positive experiences. A shout-out and thank-you goes to Dan for driving us at the end of the week to the Go Train so that we could have a fun afternoon of recreation downtown Toronto. And most importantly of all, thanks to all of you for your support! I can assure you that the time, or donations you gave were truly appreciated and needed for the wonderful week we all had. We are very grateful, thank you very much!

### **Canada Youth: Debbie Plant**

JEREMIAH 31: 7-10

*For thus says the Lord: “Sing aloud with gladness for Jacob, and raise shouts for the chief of the nations; proclaim, give praise, and say, ‘O, Lord, save your people, the remnant of Israel.’ Behold, I will bring them from the north country and gather them from the farthest parts of the earth, among them the blind and the lame, the pregnant woman and she who is in labour, together; a great company, they shall return here. With weeping they shall come, and with pleas for mercy I will lead them back, I will make them walk by brooks of water, in a straight path in which they shall not stumble, for I am a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my firstborn. “Hear the word of the Lord, O nations, and declare it in the coastlands far away; say, ‘He who scattered Israel will gather them, and will keep them as a shepherd keeps his flock.’”*

And gather them in, he did. The youth and their leaders came from coast, to coast to coast in Canada - but they also came from Korea, Romania, Africa..... and they came gladly.

You have read the personal reports from the Youth who went to CY. They spoke about their experiences for the week. For Bella and Amanda, it was their first time. Lauren had been in 2014. They got to choose what they would talk about. The only part of CY that was “off limits” was Thursday of that week. I was saving that one for me.

You see, on the Thursdays of CY week, we usually cover social justice. It is a day that is serious and meaningful, which also translates to being thought provoking and emotional. It is felt that the Youth have learned a lot at that point, so we can get into a deeper meaning of the living Gospels.

At the beginning of the week, we are given meals cards and 3 times a day, we would go to the cafeteria for our meals. Thursday morning, everyone headed to breakfast to find the doors locked. Puzzled, they looked for a leader to explain what was happening. There was a set up and we lined up to receive a bottle of water, a granola bar and a piece of fruit. We were then told to head outside. We did this not knowing what to expect yet. This was not the normal CY start of the day. We were then informed that we would be put into groups – families – and we would be given a list of people we were to portray. Role play.... Okay, we got that. We were given instructions to pick out a name for our family, and who would be in what role - a pregnant mother who supports her family, a husband that is an activist at work, who loses his job and has a warrant for his arrest that he is trying to hide from, children, aunts, you get the picture. Then we were given a blind fold to wear. At that point, we were divided up, spun around and told to find our families. We had to shout out the names and try to get back together. Once we were together again, we were told that some of us were injured and we had to keep the family together as we travelled, Travelled??? Yes. The leaders (not me) became guards, very unfriendly guards, and they forced us to go to different places and wait for periods of time. If we spoke, we were reprimanded. If we were too slow, we were yelled at to hurry up. Slowly, we were beginning to understand how a family might feel, on the run or being watched under guard. Sometimes, we were with many groups and other times we were separated from the other groups. We were then taken to a last station and told that these were the border guards of the country that we wanted to seek refugee status from. As we stood with our families, we watched as other families were called up. We saw many rejected and sent back. We were told that we could

plead our case any way we wanted to BUT to remember that the guards may NOT speak our language. I had been chosen at the start of the exercise to be the pregnant Mom trying to save her family while her husband had been injured and had a warrant out for his arrest. We were to use any means possible in pleading our case. I used sign language, humility, begging, deference, I would not meet their cold stare. And I was rejected the first time because I had brought papers with me, but one paper (the important one) was left with my family. My second attempt resulted in us having a stamp on that paper. YES.... We were accepted. until one guard said "Are you sure that is what the stamp means?" We then noticed that some families were given cards. So what did this mean? Were we accepted or not?

This exercise ended shortly after that. I never did find out if the card or the stamp was the good thing. All of this took place over a 3 ½ hour span. It was just a glimpse of what a family would go through and we can tell you, it was not pleasant. It was harsh, upsetting, and scary; It was definitely an eye opener.

What followed was a debriefing as some were upset ... and so they should be. We have to live it a little to understand how people feel under such circumstances. After lunch, we had the opportunity to watch a number of films showing the trials and tribulations of some refugees trying to attain citizenship in Canada, trying to leave their countries, missing their families.

Refugees sometimes leave with nothing more than what they are wearing and with little time to plan what to take with them. the decision usually is made as quickly as possible and then the travels ensue. This is nothing new. In the Bible, we have known many who have fled, with little or nothing, as they feared for their lives – Moses, Jesus, Mary and Joseph, Naomi and Ruth and Hagar. We must all try do our part

In **Joshua 20**: the Bible states, "Then the LORD spoke to Joshua, saying, "Speak to the sons of Israel, saying, Designate the cities of refuge." Events like CY and the teaching that happens, as we create the Sons AND Daughters of Israel who will create the next cities of refuge.




