

One: To those who cry out to God, God answers and is gracious.



The Power to Make Change Happen

When Iness Mayuni decided to join a self-help group in her Malawian village, her goal was simple: to take better care of her family.

Supported by PWS&D's Building Sustainable Livelihoods project, self-help group members save together and borrow small loans to meet their needs.

With no income and little authority at home, Iness had to ask her husband for money if she needed to buy something. With loans from her self-help group, she started a small business that allows her to afford food and school fees for her children.

The money is important, but the real change for Iness is the way she feels—powerful. Iness is helping support her family and making decisions for their well-being because she feels confident in her ability to take control of her family's future.

"We are poor," she shares. "But now we can take care of ourselves."

IT'S TIME FOR JUSTICE

In answer to the question "which commandment in the law is greatest?" Jesus replied, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind...And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself'" (Mt. 22:37, 39).

Discrimination Against People Living with Albinism in Sub-Saharan Africa

Albinism is a rare, non-contagious, inherited genetic condition that reduc the amount of melanin pigment formed in the skin, hair and/or eyes, causing the skin to be of a translucent white hue and vulnerable to skin cancer.

There is a higher prevalence of albinism in parts of sub-Saharan Africa. People with albinism are vulnerable to prejudice, mental and physical abuse and even death. Amnesty International and other international organizations have documented cases where organs and body parts are sold because they are falsely thought to possess special powers.



In some cases, police are reluctant to prosecute cases and courts may deliver sentences that do not fit the gravity of the crime when offences are committed against people with albinism. As a result, albinism associations emphasize the need to debunk myths and strengthen protections for people with the condition.



The Church Responds

Ndirande Centre for the Handicapped in Malawi was started in 1982 to support mothers caring for children with mental and physical disabilities. A number of children with albinism come to the Centre, which is supported by PWS&D. Former Presbyterian missionary, Linda Inglis writes: "Poverty and a lack of government services meant that many children were left without any physical or emotional support."

The Moderator of the 2017 General Assembly wrote to the Governments of Malawi, Tanzania and Ghana. The Moderator lamented the violence against people with albinism and encouraged these governments to strengthen protections for people with albinism.
