Healthy Futures Start from the Ground

Sandra Martínez couldn't understand why her sons Erling and Gerson were chronically ill and underweight.

The children were eating, but they were also suffering from the effects of malnutrition - often called hidden hunger.

In Sandra's village in Nicaragua, rates of poverty and hunger are high. Accessing nutritious food and health care is a challenge, meaning many children experience nutrient deficiencies, which can cause illness and delays in growth.

With other participants of a PWS&D project helping families improve food security and nutrition, Sandra learned that a diet rich in fresh produce is an important way to decrease malnutrition. She was able to start a vegetable garden, now brimming with plants to incorporate into nourishing

recipes.

"My family's diet has improved because we have learned about the nutritional value of natural foods - those produced in the community and rich in nutrients for our bodies."

Most of all, Sandra is thankful that her boys are healthy and no longer anemic.

This Advent season, help fuel bodies and minds with nutritious food so that future generations can thrive.
