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## A message from our Minister!

Behold! I am about to do a new thing!

After the children of God had lived in captivity for decades, the prophet Isaiah declared these words. God was going to act; God will save God's people. How were the people to know that this promise would come true? The prophet went on to recount the many ways that God had saved his people in the past. Just as God had acted in history to deliver the descendants of Abraham from slavery in Egypt, God would once more hear their cry and set them free. The God of Israel was faithful to the divine promises.

We are in a season of "new things" - both in the Adams' household and within the congregation of St. John's. In our house, we are getting used to a new home and a new community. As your minister, I am learning how things are done in a new congregation, new routines and traditions, and learning new names - lots of new names. And as a congregation, I am sure you will be exposed to new things, as you get used to the way that I lead in worship and in some of the ways I approach ministry. Yet, as the church we have this assurance - that the God in whom we trust is our constant, and these new things are part of the new life God offers to us, individually and as a congregation. So let us look for the new things God is doing in our very midst, even now; and rejoice.

This is an important time of the year for Fundscrip, because we make the greatest percentage of profits near Christmas. Remember especially our Tim Horton supplier that gives us a 5% return year-round.

Once again, I have been asked by the Editor of our Newsletter to write something about St. John's Archives, and I welcome this opportunity to share such with the readers of this issue. But first let it be noted that an Archives is not a Library, in which books and periodicals can be loaned out to interested readers. Nor is it a Museum! Archives deal with the preservation of history! St. John's Archives preserves books, registers, and printed and handwritten articles pertaining to our history, for the benefit, not only of the present generation, but as well for those who will follow us in the faith and life and work of St. John's Church. Bona fide researchers, however, are allowed access to our Records when asked, but materials provided cannot be taken off the premises! Those who wish to consult our materials do so under the supervision of the Archivist. Almost all of holdings are of the "one of" nature - which increases their value to St. John's. This is our history and it must be zealously guarded and preserved for the generations who will follow us in their day!

Therefore, what is in our Archives? The first filed documents are the Minutes of the chief governing body in the Congregation - the Session. Ours date back to 1787. Secondly, are the Minutes of the Board of Managers, whose concern is with the temporal affairs of the congregation, and finally, the Minutes of the Trustees of the congregation. But we are not limited to such works only - the records of the Missionary Societies of the congregation, and our work with children and youth over the years also deserve their place. We are indeed fortunate to have in our holdings, photos of all the Ministers who have served St. John's since 1787, and copies of Congregational Photo Directories over the years. These men (and two women - the Revs. Hanna & Draffin, were the leaders of the Congregation in their day, but it is regrettable that there is very little of social comment on their life and work.

Where are our Archives located? In a very appropriate place - the "Old Vestry" - in the Church basement. This room was the Minister's "meeting place" for individuals contemplating marriage, or Baptism for their children, or arranging for the funeral of loved ones. It has also been used for the meeting of a Sunday School class. The 'new' St. John's of 1887 included this room for its Minister. It is noted that this room, in the beginning, had its own heating system, as there are 2 chimney cleanouts in the north wall! This was obviously a means to save on fuel costs, since it meant that the Church sanctuary did not have to be heated for the benefit of the Minister, when he was on the premises.

If you wish to access "the old vestry" and the Archives Room after worship some Sunday, take the southeast exit from the sanctuary down a few steps, and you can walk right into the St. John's Archives! If you wish more information or have more interest contact our Archivist, the Rev. Fred Rennie for an appointment. He works one day a week organizing and filing the materials he receives.


