

#### From the Minister's Desk

If you are in ministry long enough, you will compile a catalogue of scriptures that have names associated with them; favourite passages, scriptures they want to have read at their funerals, biblical texts that give them hope. Florence, Laurene, Carol – all are called to mind as I read the passages that once I read for them. Carol suffered from severe rheumatoid arthritis and spent most days in pain. She had had numerous surgeries to fuse various parts of her spine and wore a neck brace to hold her head in place. Carol shared with me that before each surgery she would ask her husband, John, to read Psalm 91.

You who live in the shelter of the Most High, who abide in the shadow of the Almighty will say to the Lord, "My refuge and my fortress; my God in whom I trust."

Down through the years I have remembered how Carol found comfort and strength in the words of Psalm 91, and therefore I have oftentimes read this Psalm to other people I have visited in the hospital. But invariably, I will arrive at these verses:

A thousand may fall at your side and ten thousand at your right hand, but it will not come near you. You will only look with your eyes and see the punishment of the wicked.

It is an uncomfortable moment. Psalm 91 reminds us that God's watchful care exists in the midst of suffering. Carol cherished these words and found hope in them, because she was faced with the uncertainty and anxiety of surgery.

We have now made it through one year of this COVID-19 pandemic. We have all experienced feelings of fear, anxiety, and frustration as our knowledge of this disease has developed, and as we have sought to keep ourselves safe. Along the way, there have been members of our congregation who have suffered health issues and loss. And yet, time and again, as I speak with members of St. John's they remark on how blessed they feel. They may not say it in quite the same manner as the Psalmist, but they have experienced the assurance that comes with dwelling in the shelter of the Most High. All of us have a sense that we have been blessed. We would not go back, but we rejoice that grace has seen us safe thus far.

And now, we are beginning to look forward. Every day I speak to someone who is anxious to let me know that they have received their vaccine. Each of us is looking forward to new life. We are

looking toward gathering for worship; all the while acknowledging that things won't be the same as they were in the past. Time has changed. We have changed. As we begin to think about what we will do once we are allowed to move more freely, I would invite you to think about what the future will look like? What lessons have we learned over this past year? How will these lessons change our old patterns and routines?

Through May and June, we will bring together members and adherents of St. John's to reflect upon the lessons we have learned in this past year and discuss who we wish to become as a congregation. For those without internet access, we will make questionnaires available so they can participate also. This is a time of opportunity and renewal, as we acknowledge that God is calling us into a new future.



We hope you will take this opportunity to share your thoughts on what God has done and is doing in and through the church.



## A note from Clarice...


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### Highlighting Judy, Hubert, Daniel, Patrick and David
