In the Christmas story, the star which the magi followed shone brightly, and led the travelers to the infant Jesus. Elsewhere, Luke reports that when the angel of the Lord appeared to the shepherds out in the fields, "the glory of the Lord shone around them." The birth of Jesus Christ, and the hope he came to bring, was like light shining into our darkness.

Sometimes it may seem like these are dark days indeed. Environmental and economic concerns dominate the news. But into that darkness, the promise of Christ still rings true – that God sent God's Son into the world to redeem the creation from all those things that separate us from God and the light of God's love. Jesus Christ is our hope, and as we learn more about him and the love of God that Christ came to show us, we will discover new ways to look at the world.

As we move through the season of Advent, let us pray that the hope, peace, joy and love of this season will reign in our lives and in our world.
